# Methodology

## Sampling

To address the research aims and objectives of the public dialogue, Ipsos UK and the University of Leeds adopted robust approach that enabled participants to understand climate adaptation as a concept in their local area, so that principles and guidance produced from the dialogue will be well-grounded.

Following the completion of a literature review conducted by University of Leeds (see **Annex C**), and engagement with stakeholders to inform the design of materials and the workshops themselves (for details on the Oversight Group's members see **Annex B**, for the stimulus materials and discussion guides used in workshops, see **Annex D**), sample design was underpinned around the following key climate hazards for England:

- Flooding (coastal, river and surface water)
- Coastal erosion
- Overheating
- Water stress
- Storminess (nationally, rather than for specific geographic areas)

In order to facilitate a more grounded understanding of climate adaptation amongst participants, a place-based sampling approach was used. The team recruited four place-based cohorts of **30 people (120 total)**, using the below sampling matrix to reflect the demographics of the local population. A total of **112 participants** attended Workshop 1. Over the course of the dialogue, some participants dropped out, meaning that **107** participated in the final place-based workshops before the national summit.

All workshops (including the summit) took place between 6 – 9pm via Zoom. Participants were paid an incentive to attend all six workshops and the final summit.

### Cohort 1: Greater Manchester

Cohort 1 is intended largely to focus on flooding impacts, though also overheating and storms.

### Cohort 3: Dartmoor and Exmoor

The intention for this cohort is to capture the perspective of those living closer to an area that is classed as the countryside, i.e. has a different perspective on wildlife to other areas. We expect the focus here to be across flooding, overheating/wildfire, wildlife and storms. Note the ethnicity quotas are more relaxed.
